Year 7 Bring History to Life in Battle of Hastings Re-enactment



This week, our Year 7 History students stepped back nearly 1,000 years to re-enact one of the most significant moments in England's past, the Battle of Hastings. In honour of the anniversary of this historic event, students took their learning out of the classroom and onto the school field for a fun and educational re-creation of the famous 1066 battle.

After exploring the dramatic events leading up to the Norman conquest, including the death of Edward the Confessor, three rival claims to the throne, the Viking invasion, and the battles at Stamford Bridge and Hastings. Students were ready to put their knowledge into action. Equipped with homemade shields, tin-foil swords, and cardboard battle axes, they brought great enthusiasm and creativity to the day. Under the guidance of History teacher Mr Stuart, the Saxon and Norman armies lined up, re-enacting the tactics, drama, and famous moments of the battle that changed England forever.

Cries of "For England and the crown!" rang out from the Saxon lines, while the Normans responded with "God wills it! Normandy will rule!" In the end , just as it happened in 1066, William of Normandy's forces were victorious.

Mr Stuart said:

"This kind of activity helps students connect deeply with the past. It's not just about memorising facts — it's about understanding the people, the choices they made, and how those moments shaped our country."

The re-enactment was a highlight of the term, giving students the chance to work together, use their imaginations, and truly immerse themselves in history. It was a wonderful celebration of learning and a reminder that history can be both meaningful and great fun.

Students at MVC were both inspired and motivated following a recent visit from John, Head Coach of Arsenal's Under-21s Ladies football team.

John delivered a powerful and engaging talk, sharing his personal journey through the world of football coaching, a path marked by determination, resilience, and an unwavering passion for sport. His story began not on the pitch, but in the classroom, where he overcame the challenges of dyslexia. Rather than allowing this to limit him, John used it as fuel to drive his success, showing students that obstacles can be transformed into opportunities.

At just 18, he began coaching Under-5s and delivering PE and multi-sport sessions in schools. From these humble beginnings, his career progressed through dedication and consistent hard work. His coaching journey took him from voluntary roles at Royston Football Club to a position at MK Dons, before earning his current role at Arsenal.

Today, John leads the U21s Ladies team and has played a key part in the development of players who now represent their countries at international level.

John's message to the students at MVC was extended far beyond football. He emphasised the importance of positivity, perseverance, and making the most of every opportunity.

His visit served as a powerful reminder that success rarely happens overnight, but is built over time through passion, effort, and the right mindset. MVC was honoured to welcome such an inspiring figure, and students left with a renewed sense of ambition and belief in what they can achieve, both on and off the field.



Local business owner and mum raises over £1,400 to support Melbourn Sports Centre

Melbourn resident Sarah Tibbals has raised £1,477 to support recent improvements at Melbourn Sports Centre, helping to secure its future as a much-loved community hub. The centre is based at Melbourn Village College and facilities are enjoyed by the school and local primaries schools, as well as the local community.

Now managed by The CAM Academy Trust, a not-for-profit organisation with charitable status, the centre has recently undergone a major refurbishment, giving its facilities a fresh new look and ensuring it continues to serve local residents for years to come.

Recognising the centre's vital role in local life, Sarah launched a GoFundMe campaign to help

the charity deliver the improvements.

Sarah said: "I got involved with the GoFundMe campaign simply because, as a local mum, and business owner, I really care about keeping the sports centre going," she explained. "It's such an important part of our village – somewhere that brings families, children, and people of all ages together."

The sports centre has long served as a hub for gymgoers, swimmers, and community events, making it a cornerstone of village life. With facilities in need of a refresh, Sarah's fundraising efforts have come at the perfect time.

"Places like this are at the heart of our community, and once we lose them, they're so hard to get back," she said.

The centre manager Graham Johnson-Mack said, "Thanks to Sarah's determination, and the generosity of local donors we are now able to give the changing areas some much needed attention."

Graham added "With Sarah's help, and with the investment from The CAM Academy Trust, I feel proud of the centre, and excited for its future. The refreshed gym and swimming pool look great; we have relaunched swimming lessons and aquafit classes and have lots more plans. We encourage the community to come and have a look and join up as members. It's great value, and a great place to be.
